Community Boards

represent and act as an advocate for the interests of the community

- This is a 'new' system of control over the sale and supply of alcohol
- Includes consumption
- Characteristics include 'reasonableness'
- Has a local component
- About minimizing the harm
- Allows for a local alcohol policy

Some new words

- Amenity and good order
- Reasonable
- Minimizing Harm
- Precautionary approach
- Criteria for the issue of licences

Some thoughts to discuss

- Key driver of the Act is increased local decisionmaking
- A precautionary approach may be used (providing it is evidentially based).
- Changes to reduce trading hours must be backedup by local evidence.
- It is important to identify local issues using local information – it's the local that counts!
- Use the best local evidence available use statistics and personal experiences.

Gathering evidence and some stories

- Keep it local
- Work with the agencies
- Consider a small community based group to support other data and local stories that support the evidence
- Other sources Ambulance, ACC
- Maybe meet regularly
- New licences will always be a challenge

Supporting Objectors

- Getting the message out there
- Publish on the web?
- Stick to the criteria
- Support the community or appear before DLC?
- Objectors will likely be nervous
- Written evidence is best
- Tell their stories

The criteria -105 - 106 - 142

- Object of the Act
- Suitability
- Local Alcohol Policy
- Services
- Oesign and Layout
- Amenity and Good order
- Systems and Training
- Any other matters

Special licences

- Additional to section 105
- Applicants proposal
- Large events management plan
- Consent issues
- Output Police and Council views

What else

- Find and use relevant local information
- Keep the community informed on what is happening
- New licences will be the most difficult to deal with
- Petitions are only part of the plan
- What is the best role for a Community Board
- Advocate or support Acting on behalf of the community at a hearing
- This is not a bad piece of legislation just some bits missing

- Community Boards are important in their communities
- They represent and act as an advocate for the interests of the community
- The community should be heard
- You can help with advice, support, information and connecting with the right people
